Community Design & Land-Use Planning in Silver City

Goal: to promote growth management measures that will preserve the livability of the community and the friendly, small-town character of Silver City.

Needs: In order to prevent haphazard sprawl, the group needs political power, governmental support, professional help, and community involvement. Integrating the business community and its culture into this effort is seen as essential.

Existing Assets: The city infrastructure itself, an actively growing community, the spirit of interested people, and potential support from many organizations, including SIGRED, Hometown Initiative, Southwest Hispanic Roundtable, and GRIP.

Next Steps: To get started, the group needs to understand the town land use code, get educated about development, and support candidates friendly to a growth management approach. The group has identified the following next steps: form a political action committee for candidates friendly to managed growth efforts, work with these officials once elected, read and understand land use code.

Meetings: The group has not had regular meetings, but has met to plan specific actions as needed. Members do attend regular meetings of the city council, county commission, and planning-related committees.

Community Cleanup Initiative

Goal: Pollution, it was agreed, should be defined broadly to include light and noise pollution. Conducting an annual community-wide cleanup effort was discussed. The group also found it important to get at the roots of why people pollute, and how pollution in its many forms can be prevented.

In the end, no specific goal was chosen from among several suggestions, including: addressing the causes of community neglect; establishing community stewardship; creating community consciousness to prevent trash, light, and noise pollution; and promoting responsibility in communities.

Needs: surveys of how many citations are being given for existing codes, such as noise and nuisance ordinances; and support from government officials, church organizations, schools, boy scouts, and other community members.

Existing Assets: The group already has many resources to offer, such as time, research skills, community support, and a lot of experience from previous endeavors to address pollution concerns.

Next Steps: The group decided to research and develop a list of good citizenship responsibilities as well as other organizations on a federal and state level that may provide guidance or funding for future initiatives. Efforts already underway with the Dark Skies group will be continued.

Update: It has been suggested that Silver City pursue affiliation with a national organization called Keep America Beautiful.

Related Effort:

- A recycling committee has formed in the wake of this summer's decision by the Southwest Solid Waste Authority to suspend collection of glass and plastic. The committee aims to promote education, particularly in the schools, encourage political activism, and develop alternatives for recycling, including the possibility of local uses for some of the recycled materials, by governments, nonprofits, or businesses.
